A BIG WIN FOR THE MSD: MACKEY PENDERGRAST NAMED SUPERINTENDENT OF THE YEAR FOR THE STATE OF NEW JERSEY!



The New Jersey Association of School Administrators (NJASA) has chosen Mackey Pendergrast, Superintendent of the Morris School District, for New Jersey's Superintendent of the Year. Mr. Pendergrast will now represent the State as a candidate for the American Association of School Administrators (AASA) National Superintendent of the Year Award, which recognizes the talent, vision, and impact of our nation's public school leaders. He was named Morris County Superintendent of the Year in June and Region I Superintendent of the Year for North Jersey in September.

This distinction comes at the start of Pendergrast's fifth year as superintendent of the Morris School District and his ninth year overall as a superintendent. He began his public school teaching career as a high school history teacher and varsity basketball coach for the Summit Public Schools and held positions in central office administration for the Westfield Public School District and the West Morris Regional High School District before becoming superintendent of West Morris in 2011.

Board of Education President Lisa Pollak and Vice President Nancy Bangiola said they were "absolutely thrilled but hardly surprised" by their superintendent's recent accolades, including the state's top honors. more on page 3>

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


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MSD Selected for Equity and Excellence Showcase at National Press Club



The national spotlight was on the Morris School District on October 16, when Superintendent Mackey Pendergrast joined nine other public school leaders from across the U.S. at the National Press Club in Washington, D.C. for the Equity and Excellence: Innovation in American Public Education showcase. The showcase was organized by Digital Promise, a nonprofit dedicated to improving educational opportunities and outcomes through innovative practices and technologies. Superintendents and other public school administrators, education policy makers and thought leaders, and representatives from the press attended the event to learn how successful school districts are addressing the equity gap and positively impacting the lives of marginalized students.

Mr. Pendergrast highlighted the District's multistrategy approach to closing achievement gaps in reading and writing at Frelinghuysen Middle School. He explained, "Four years ago, state standardized test scores revealed marked disparities in student performance among our demographic subgroups, with students of color, economically-disadvantaged students, and students with IEPs performing lower than white and non-economically disadvantaged students. At the same time, discipline data showed disproportionately higher numbers of behavioral referrals, detentions, and suspensions for African-American and Hispanic students. Principal Joe Uglialoro and I determined that, in order to create impactful, lasting change at the middle school in terms of equity, access, and achievement, we needed to take the broad view and confront both the reading and writing gap as well as the climate gap."

A study just published by the American Educational Research Association (AERA) validates their approach; Stanford University Professor Francis Pearman and colleagues have now documented the relationship between racial disparities in school discipline rates and academic achievement between black and white students nationwide. (See Pearman et. al. "Are Achievement Gaps Related to Discipline Gaps? Evidence From National Data.") universalization of "blended" learning, which couples technology-based and face-to-face instruction, so that all students can have equal access to the skills and resources necessary for the 21st century.

The longitudinal data Mr. Pendergrast shared at the showcase illustrates the far-reaching impact of the District's approach. "Our results are proof of concept," he stated. A four-year comparative summary of test scores from the NJ State standardized test in English Language Arts shows significant improvement across the board for all demographic subgroups (see chart below). For example, economically disadvantaged students receiving a passing score improved by 44 percentage points (from 18% in 2014-15 to 62% in 2018-19). African American students improved by 35 percentage points (from 30% to 65%), and Hispanic students improved by 51 percentage points (from 17% to 68%). Over the same time period, discipline rates for all demographic subgroups declined: behavioral referrals went from 788 in 2014-15 to 112 in 2018-19, suspensions from 175 to 18, and lunch detentions from a high of 1034 down to 34.

Pendergrast calls these results "remarkable," and noted that it was the combination of coordinated strategies that proved so effective: "It is no mistake that while suspensions and behavioral referrals have dropped dramatically, we have simultaneously seen a dramatic rise in student growth and achievement in reading and writing. All of the strategies we conceptualized and employed were necessary in concert, and it was the comprehensiveness and coherency of our approach that enabled its success. Simply reading and writing more is not enough to create this type of improvement unless it is accompanied by the intentional use of data, careful and targeted integration of technology, sustained professional training and dialogue, investment in student participation and social capital, and a shift in culture and climate so that all students feel that they belong and have value in our schools."

Pendergrast added: "What is more, these strategies were not conceived and implemented incidentally; they are aligned to our district mission and firmly rooted in our values—values that are shared by the community and advanced by our partnerships with our stakeholders. The Morris School District is part of a legacy of committing to inclusive, accessible education for all students. We are proud of that legacy, and we will continue to work hard toward its realization."

Both he and Principal Uglialoro gave great credit to the teachers and counselors at Frelinghuysen Middle School for their "uncompromising commitment to providing exceptional instruction, meeting the needs of each student, and inspiring our students to reach new heights."

Humanities Academy Teachers Dive Deep into Design Thinking at Stanford

Q: What do places like MIT, Princeton, and Stanford have in common with the Morristown High School Academies?

A: High-level, innovative programs in Design Thinking!

This summer, Morristown High School English teachers John Madden and Matt Daly spent an intensive three days at the K12 Lab, one of several rigorous professional learning opportunities offered by Stanford University's d.school-the nation's top program in design thinking. "Design thinking" is a human-centered methodology for addressing real-world problems that foregrounds empathy; throughout its iterative stages, design thinking revolves around a deep interest in developing an understanding of the people for whom we are designing. Stanford's K12 Lab gives educators the "creative confidence" to further their knowledge of design thinking through actual design challenges and to develop specific strategies for implementing the methodology in their own classrooms and schools.

As part of a diverse international cohort of 50 teachers and school leaders, Madden and Daly assumed the role of students in an introductory design thinking course. This enabled them to experience instruction from the students' point of view as they collaborated with other educators to problem-solve and negotiated a range of different perspectives and levels of expertise. Daly recalls, "the emphasis on creating empathy in our designs was constant throughout the activities, and really brought home the concept and importance of keeping the 'human' in human-centered design." They also found a strong correlation between the imperative to recognize one's assumptions and biases in the design process, a salient theme of the Stanford workshop, and their own professional development in Culturally Responsive Practices and Social-Emotional Learning, which teachers in the Morris School District have been focusing on over the past two years.

In the Humanities Academy, students learn the fundamentals of the design thinking process in their first year of the program and then focus on its various applications through in-depth, self-directed projects in subsequent years. Their course of study culminates in an original senior-year creation and presentation. Because feedback is essential to the design thinking approach, students are given multiple opportunities in and out of the classroom to develop ideas and share their research with the school and wider community. Madden and Daly have established a series of "In the Schools" forums held at the town/township library for this purpose, and students present their end-of-year projects at the annual Humanities Night at the high

school. Along with their peers in the STEM Academy, Humanities students can attend several design thinking sessions at Princeton University, where they work side by side with Princeton undergrads on design challenges.

Together with their Humanities Academy classes, Madden and Daly have devised a core set of "Habits of Mind" that students learn to cultivate and draw from as they approach their coursework and research projects. These habits of mind include values-based principles such as empathy, mindfulness, and intentionality as well as principles that are reflected in an individual's behavior, like flexibility, intrinsic motivation, and persistence. Thus, the Humanities Academy emphasizes the significance of the metacognitive dimension of learning: a student's mindset is integral to the creative process and to the end result. According to Madden, their approach to teaching vis-a-vis "habits of mind" was echoed throughout the workshop at Stanford's K12 Lab. "It was tremendously gratifying to realize how far developed our program at Morristown High is, and how the ideas coming out of Stanford are things our students are already well-versed in here in the Humanities Academy," he stated.

Having left Stanford with an invaluable network of teachers and professors to continue learning from, with new activities and resources to export into their own classrooms, and with new ways to frame objectives such as approaching a text or writing a paper, Madden and Daly want to ensure that their experience in the K12 Lab travels back to the MSD. They look forward to opportunities to dialogue with colleagues from a range of academic fields about ways that this methodology can inform teaching practices across subject areas and bring teachers from different disciplines together through a shared and richly productive language of inquiry.

AP classes has also risen steadily; the number of AP exams passed by students at Morristown High School has more than doubled since 2015. MHS also had the greatest number of students in Morris County enrolled in BC Calculus and Physics C (the highest level math and science courses offered). Pendergrast notes that these impressive shifts in student achievement reflect "greater access to exceptional opportunities for more and more of our students to engage their intellectual curiosity and pursue their passions—which means they graduate from our district with better preparation for their futures."

Love of Reading Cont'd

While this event provided an evening of entertainment and fun, the underlying goal, to create stronger relationships between home and school for student success in reading, was an emphasis. Tools to help parents improve family literacy were shared, and each family received a signed copy of *The Three Ninja Pigs*, even if they did not attend. In addition, each second-grade teacher facilitated an in-class activity to support the book, and each family received a take-home list of supporting activities.

Parents' literacy skills, along with their attitudes about learning and formal education, have an immense impact on their children's academic achievement. Programs like the MEF and MSD Family Author Experience help strengthen the intergenerational nature of literacy. A spring session will take place in April at Hillcrest and Woodland schools and will feature author Sarah Aronson. The Morris Educational Foundation is proud to have partnered with the Brighthouse Financial Foundation to bring the MEF and MSD Family Author Experience to all 360 second graders in our schools.

Along these lines, the Morris School District has provided universal Wi-Fi to all students in the district who need it, operationalized a oneto-one chromebook program for grades 6-12, and implemented "blended learning" methodologies, which integrate the best of digital and face-to-face learning in the classroom.

Pendergrast refers to his post in the Morris School District as his "dream job": "I love turning left off my street every morning and driving into Morristown to work with such a talented, dedicated group of educators. It is so gratifying to know that our collective successes are being recognized and celebrated; we all have so much to be proud of."

For Pendergrast, the Superintendent of the Year award is a two-fold honor: "What an immeasurably rewarding experience it has been for me to be part of the Morris School District's unique 'community of communities' and to see it ascend. And to have the privilege of representing an ascending state, also a unique 'community of communities' that is at the forefront of high-quality innovation in public education, is an especially profound honor."





Alumni Spotlight: Kendall Rogers Morristown High School Class of 2017



Kendall Rogers's experiences in the Morris School District both on and off the field helped shape him into the principled and productive person he is today.

Kendall Rogers, Morristown High School class of 2017, is a junior at Bowdoin College. As a religion major and member of Bowdoin's men's lacrosse team, he no longer lives in Morristown. However, Kendall's Morris School District upbringing lives on in him, particularly the MSD goal that "Graduates of the Morris School District will be equipped to live a principled and productive life where they see their connections and responsibilities to local and global communities."

Kendall forged one such connection with Harlem youth last summer through his volunteerism and mentorship with Harlem Lacrosse. He is proud to incorporate his love of the sport with his passion for teaching to positively impact minorities. As an athlete of color, Kendall also mentors peer athletes at Bowdoin through the Athletes of Color Coalition. He credits his experience in the Morris School District with this advocacy. "Morristown High School prepared me to stand up to things that don't embody a welcoming experience for everyone...it allowed me to see that not all people experience or see things in the same way."

The Rogers family has deep roots in the Morristown community. His father Robert has led the Church

of God in Christ For All Saints for 24 years, his grandfather, for 30 years before that. Kendall started playing lacrosse in town as a third grader. He credits his experience as a Morristown High School lacrosse player and two-time captain with fostering his volunteerism. The family culture of the team, led by Coach Jeff Bigas at the time, encouraged giving back to the community. He still joins former teammates in Morristown every Thanksgiving to distribute food to those in need.

Kendall encourages Morristown High School students to seek personally meaningful volunteer work, not just for college applications, but to truly connect with the community. He also highly recommends that all students take advantage of the broad array of classes offered at Morristown High School, from Advanced Placement sciences and math to humanities and social studies to literature and arts.

"You never know where you will find your passion. It could be on the field, in the classroom, or with a community organization. I entered Bowdoin as a neuroscience major, but after I took one religion class, I realized I found another path. I encourage all students to explore many options to find their path."

Washington Valley Schoolhouse Celebrates 150 Years

Immortalized in the Morris School District's logo, which features the image of a charming little red schoolhouse, the Washington Valley Schoolhouse celebrated its 150-year anniversary this fall.

The traditional one-room schoolhouse was built in 1869 at the corner of Washington Valley Road and Schoolhouse Lane in Morris Township, where it still stands today. The school served children ages 5-17 and could accommodate up to 52 students comfortably in its single classroom, although the average daily attendance in 1874, one year for which precise records remain, was 22. The school was illuminated by hanging kerosene lamps and the natural light from its seven-foot tall windows. A stove on one side of the room provided heat in the colder months. Older students were appointed by the teacher to bring in wood and coal for the stove, and empty ashes. In 1913, with the decline of the oneroom schoolhouse as student populations rapidly increased, the Washington Valley Schoolhouse closed, and students were sent to the larger Hillside School nearby.

According to Sue Young, President of the WVCA, the neighborhood pride in the schoolhouse and its central role in the lives of Valley residents throughout the years has helped preserve its place in the history of the Township. Mrs. Young says it has been a privilege to ensure that the legacy of the Washington Valley Schoolhouse endures. "Time will never erase the work that has been accomplished and the lives this little red, one-room Schoolhouse has enriched," she remarked. 
